Bridge of Allan 100 Years Ago

BRIDGE OF ALLAN TOWN COUNCIL An alleged nuisance

The minutes of the Works Committee so bore report that the Clerk was instructed to write Miss Alexander, fish merchant, Henderson Street, with reference to the water which so frequently overflows from the shop window and runs over the pavement. He was instructed to say that, as the result of this overflow, in dry weather the pavement was both unsightly to look at and unpleasant for foot-passengers, while during frosty weather, after the water had become frozen, the pavement in front of the window became most unsafe, and that it was accordingly hoped Miss Alexander would have the defect, which gave rise to the nuisance, remedied, as, otherwise, it would be necessary to take legal proceedings against her. The need for this, the Clerk was asked to say, would be regretted, but, as Miss Alexander's attention had already been drawn to the matter without result, no other course appeared to be open to the Council in the interests of the public. - Approved.
